


shows the medallion after the staining.

MISSION ENDOWMENT FUND MID-YEAR UPDATE

So far this year, the Mission Endowment Fund Committee has recommended, and the Congregational Council has approved, six grants totaling \$91,700. The six grant recipients are:

- ·Benevilla: \$15,000 for furniture and IT equipment for the Mary Boyard Center
- ·Thrive AZ: \$5,000 for furniture for their Family Reunification Room
- ·Rainbow Acres: \$10,000 for their Ranchers Scholarship Fund
- ·Kirurumu Health Center in Tanzania: \$6,500 for windows for their new clinic wing
- ·Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary (PLTS): \$52,200 for three scholarships for students preparing to become pastors
- ·University of Arizona Campus Ministry: \$3,000 for their Wednesday evening student meals

The total grant funds for 2025 are \$119,048, leaving \$27,348 for distribution yet this year. The committee will resume regular monthly meetings in September.

The Mission Endowment Fund Committee members are: Shirley Marsh, Marcia Steil (Council Rep), Gary Kakert, Randy Farwell, Dean Lewellen, and the ex-officio members are Pastor Jeff and Treasurer Ron Gusé.









NADABURG SCHOOL SUPPLIES NEEDED



The Nadaburg Unified School District #81 is a K-12 school district in the town of Wittman, AZ. It operates two elementary schools: Nadaburg Elementary (the historical school in the town) as well as Desert Oasis Elementary in the Surprise city limits; eight miles from LOL. Nadaburg also operates Mountainside High School. Lord of Life has a long history of providing volunteers who tutor students and gather school supplies for the classroom teachers to aid in their teaching.

More than 75% of the students in this district receive free or reduced lunches daily, which is an indication of the poverty level in the district. The Lady with the Lamp: This gal was so dedicated, she even made night rounds to tend to her patients. No wonder they called her "The Lady with the Lamp."


Data Darling: Besides nursing, Florence loved crunching numbers. She used data to make healthcare a whole lot better.


SEPTEMBER SATURDAY NITE LIFE

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE AT LORD OF LIFE 2025

Lord of Life is a 42-year-old Sun City West (SCW) Lutheran Church that serves many needs of the congregation and the surrounding community. It is unique since it sits at one of the busiest corners in SCW. The campus is about 4.5 acres and contains five buildings with 250 parking spaces and six golf cart spaces. Buildings and Grounds (B&G) is a committee dedicated to keeping the campus viable and updated for today and the future.

I am James McLinn, present head of B&G. My B&G journey started in March 2015 when I moved into SCW and looked around for a good church. After surveying seven churches in Sun City and SCW, I selected Lord of Life based upon many of its strengths. In October of that year, I attended a meeting for church groups and selected B&G to join. At that time Michael (Mick) Anderson from Sun Village was the head of B&G and I, the newest member. My first few years were spent learning a lot about LOL by trimming bushes and trees and working with the part-time campus maintenance man. These years were mainly maintenance work and doing a few updates around the campus. As time passed, I learned more about the many campus electrical issues, plumbing problems, the heating and cooling issues and some of the audio-visual problems. In October 2023 I began leading the committee and spent increasing time helping rebuild the committee and plan for the future. Luckily in November 2023, Frank Petrella arrived to fill a newly created full-time position. I took him around on a campus walk and showed him the main electrical closets, the water shutoffs, and where other items of importance were found. Not two weeks later, Frank was in on a Saturday afternoon by himself when a 2-inch water line ruptured under a sidewalk in the courtyard. Fast action by Frank prevented a major flood of the courtyard and sanctuary.

B&G has many small responsibilities, either alone or in cooperation with other important church groups. B&G stays busy. Over the past three years B&G has updated virtually all of the old lights on campus. In many cases a drop-in LED bulb was used to brighten areas and reduce the cost of electricity. At one time, there was a mixture of seven different fluorescent bulbs and four different incandescent bulbs and four different Halogen bulbs in use. B&G was able to get fluorescents down to three types of low-cost LEDs. Today there is only one halogen bulb left and one incandescent.

Also, over the last three years, virtually all, old-style, 15-inch high toilets have been replaced by low flow, 17.5 inch high models. LOL has 37 air conditioners to keep all the buildings cool. About half are on the roof of three buildings. Twice a year (spring and fall) we change out the air filters on all 37 units. We keep them clean and operating and remove debris that impacts their longevity. The oldest unit still operating on campus is 25 years old. B&G also keeps the areas on campus clean. This includes the courtyard, the parking lots, the bushes and trees, the sanctuary, classrooms and columbarium. One B&G member attends all the interments and takes care of the niche covers and bronze plaques.

B&G supports the wonderful music programs by changing out tables, seats and adding platforms as needed. Likewise, we help keep the kitchen going. The ice maker must be maintained as well as coffee pots and the dishwasher. The recent library changeover required books be moved, stored temporarily and made available to church members. Many clubs are dependent upon help for set up of rooms and improvement of storage areas. Chairs and shelves are maintained. B&G decorates the campus at Christmas and Easter and helps with the changeover of decorations throughout the year.

Handicapped access has been improved by adding two new parking lot handicapped ramps and adding additional automatic door over the past year, and updating one of the restrooms in the church office. Another will be added in 2025. One of most important activities was to create a 5-year campus update plan in 2023. This plan is over three pages of possible changes that might occur on campus. This "possible" list is constantly updated, often based upon parishioner's suggestions. Other activities include working with the security team to ensure the campus remains safe. This included "stop the bleed" training and training in use of fire extinguishers in every building and how to use the several heart defibrillators found on campus. Security changes were made in the office at the request of the staff. During the past year two practice fire drills have occurred during church services. Lighting has improved everywhere on campus and selective bushes and trees removed to keep the campus open. B&G also works with the plaza committee to make changes to this area. You might have seen the new fountain or the colorful crest in center courtyard. Planning continues to reduce water use and the need for electricity.

Does Lord of Life have your Emergency Contact on file?



WORSHIP ASSISTANTS

ACOLYTE

Acolytes serve at the Sunday worship services by lighting and extinguishing the altar candles. They may also be involved in a processional for special worship services.

ALTAR GUILD

This is an opportunity to participate in preparing and serving communion and decorating the altar for special occasions.

COMMUNION ASSISTANTS

Communion is served at all Lord of Life worship services. Many volunteers are needed to help serve at various services.

MUSIC OPPORTUNITIES

BIG BAND

The Lord of Life Big Band rehearses January through April and performs at several functions throughout the winter months.

CHAMBER CHOIR

This a cappella choir sings periodically at Sunday Services and special concerts. This is the only Lord of Life choir that requires an audition.

Lord of Life is a welcoming community. Greeters welcome visitors and congregation members in the Narthex prior to worship services.

LECTORS

The Biblical lessons for the worship services are read by the Lectors at each service.

USHERS

As well as assisting worshippers to their seats, the Ushers maintain many "behind the scenes" tasks throughout the worship service.

SING ALONG CHOIR

This group travels to local care facilities to bring the love of Christ to those are unable to attend church services. No rehearsals are required – just come and enjoy sharing music all year long.

VOCALISTS

Soloists and small groups are always welcome to share their gifts in a worship setting.

WORSHIP CHOIR

This choir sings at Sunday Services from October to May.

WINK (Worship in a New Key)

This group of singers preforms contemporary music at Saturday night services.

PRAYER CHAIN

Each weekday, prayer requests are collected and sent out via email to Lord of Life's Prayer Chain Participants, to pray for specific people and needs. To be added to our list of Prayer Chain Participants, contact the church office.

SOS (SURVIVED OUR SPOUSES)

This is a group of widows and widowers who have an interest in being involved in outreach to our community and various social events.

TELEPHONE MINISTRY

This team of caring callers reaches out two weeks and four weeks after Lord of Life Members are discharged from the hospital or rehab facility, to see how their recovery is progressing.

THURSDAY PRAYER GROUP

Every Thursday during the Winter season, this group of pray-ers meets to pray for Lord of Life members, leaders and staff, the church at large, and ministries we support.

TRANSPORTATION/MEAL PREPARATION

Provide transportation to local doctor appointments when usual means are not available, or prepare meals which are delivered in the first days after hospitalization when needed.

FELLOWSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

COFFEE HOUR HOST/MAKE COFFEE

On Sundays following early worship we gather in the Social Hall; make coffee, provide the treats and help serve.

FOOD & FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

This is a great way to get to meet other members. Hosts provide entrées, beverage; the guests contribute other items.

DISHWASHER

When we use glass for special occasions, we need volunteers to run the dishwasher.

SERVER

Volunteers are always needed to help serve at various dinners/meetings.

Here is a chance to help our Events Coordinator set the tables and clean up at the end of an event.
